



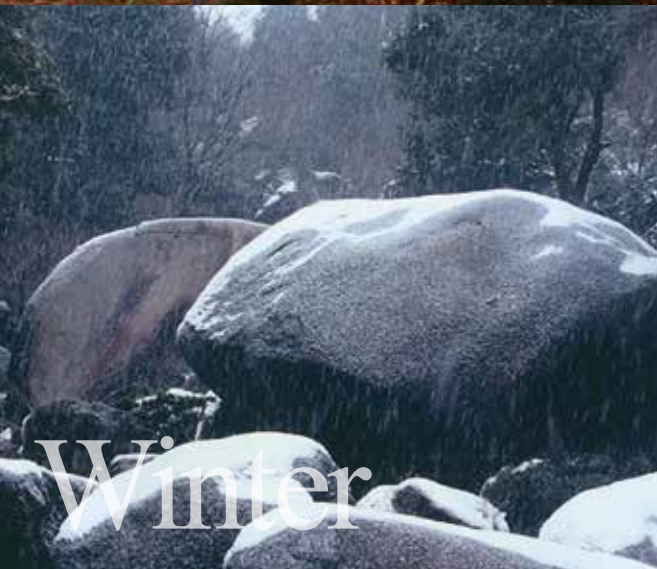

Hida Kiso River National Park

Oniiwa Park

Oniiwa Park is a marvelous and beautiful granite park located in Hida Kiso River National Park, where you will find many strangely shaped giant rocks. It's also famous for the legendary Oni (demon), Seki-no-Taro.

Four seasons in Oniiwa

You will never be bored in Oniiwa any time of the year. Enjoy azalea and cherry blossoms in spring.

Cool down by the river flowing among the rocks. Enjoy the changing colors of autumn leaves.

Snowy landscape is also too good to miss.

Origin of Oniiwa

About 800 years ago, an Oni, Seki-no-Taro, lived in this rocky mountain and would play tricks on the neighbors and the travelers going over the mountain. By an order of Emperor Goshirakawa Houou, Kouketsu Gengo Noriyasukou knocked him down. Oniiwa owes its name to this Oni (demon) and Iwa (rocky)-yama (mountain). A Japanese haiku (poem) have been handed down for generations which was inspired by this Oni and Shizuki, a name of the settlement where Oniiwa belongs.
